DIAMONDS!

Charlie Mitton, son of PP Craig and Rosemary Mitton gave an exceptional presentation on diamonds and diamond mining in Canada.

Charlie is a graduate of George Brown College in goldsmithing and Georgian College in silversmithing. After graduation Charlie worked for Burks in Toronto and Tiffany's in Vancouver. He has returned to Ridgetown and joined the family business.

Diamonds are the hardest material in the world. Diamonds are 99.5 % carbon and the remaining .05% is made up of trace elements that affect the look, clarity and shape of the stone.

The International system used to describe and value diamonds is the 4C's – cut, clarity, colour and carat weight.

The colour valuation goes from colourless to near colourless to noticeable colour. Not all colours in a diamond are desirable.

Clarity goes from flawless to internally flawless to slightly included. A flawless diamond is very rare.

Cut is very important to the value of the diamond. The symmetry and proportions of each part of the cut diamond are very important in determining the diamond's value.

Carat weight – the larger the stone the more rare and more valuable.

The Canadian Diamond mining industry is growing. Currently there are three mines operating and a fourth coming soon. Canada is one of the top 3 producers of diamonds in the world. Diamonds were first discovered in 1991 in Northern Canada, in the Northwest Territories. The first mine opened in 1998, the second mine in 2003 and the third in 2006. From 1998 to 2006 13.8 million carats of diamonds have been mined worth over 2.8 billion dollars. Canadian diamonds are known as very clean, meaning their production does not support terrorist activities as it does in other countries around the world. Fifteen percent of the world supply of diamonds comes from Canada and experts believe the mines will continue to produce for at least another 18 years.

The mines operating in the northern provinces are very conscious of the eco system in the area and work hard to preserve natural fishing and wildlife habitats. Canadian diamonds are very competitive in the world market for quality and price.
